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
The Legacy of Neferu

In the vastness of that primal dream, a young Egyptian woman appeared before me. Her naked figure, simple and majestic, gazed out at a horizon that defied all earthly understanding. She sat on the clayey earth of an unknown world, her back curved toward eternity, while two suns illuminated the landscape: one white and brilliant, the other red like a dying fire, witness to the imminent death of the stars. Before her rose an alien metropolis: spiral towers, impossible structures, domes, and arches that seemed to merge with the very curvature of space. Shadows and lights danced to the rhythm of a universal law that I did not yet understand, but which I felt like a deep heartbeat.

That image, imprinted in my consciousness like an oracle, was not just a dream, but a window to the eternal. The dawn that followed was unlike any other; I carried the imprint of that vision like a tattoo on my soul. I quickly took up my brushes and, guided by a force that welled up from my subconscious, I painted. The young Egyptian girl became the symbol of humanity searching for answers. The two suns, in the perfect balance of life and death, reflected the fragility of our cosmic destiny. The alien metropolis was the promise of civilizations older and wiser than ours.

From this first painting was born the series "Dream of a Night in Giza". It was the beginning of a journey through 46 artworks that were not just canvases, but portals to worlds, each built on foundations of visions, science, and mysticism. My brushes, impregnated with the stardust of that original dream, shaped textures that evoked nascent galaxies, iridescent lights that danced like cosmic particles, and colors that exploded in collisions of nebulae, forming expanding universes. These celestial landscapes, in their constant becoming, intertwined with scenes of life and the secrets of Ancient Egypt, as if the remote past of our world and the confines of the cosmos shared a common ancestral whisper.

The young woman who contemplated the two suns on that alien horizon was not a simple dream figure. Her presence was a symbol, an echo of the stories lost in the stone temples. Who could this traveler between worlds have been, this daughter of Earth who looked up to the stars? Was she Isis, the great goddess of magic and wisdom, whose search for Osiris led her across the thresholds of death and eternity? Or perhaps Nefertari, the queen of love and mystery, whose soul sailed with the reborn sun in the boat of Ra.

Perhaps she was Hathor, the goddess of the skies and beauty, mother of the stars and protector of cosmic travelers. In her eyes lived the lights of the firmament, and her hands wove the threads of creation. Or she might have been Nut, the goddess of the sky, whose form arched over the world, embracing all that exists in a stellar mantle. Nut, with her star-studded skin, was the bridge between day and night, between human time and divine eternity. Could this young woman represent the spirit of Nut descending to Earth to sow heavenly knowledge?

The fantastic, almost incredible, adventure this human figure might have experienced in a world beyond our comprehension would become the seed of myths. Upon returning to her time, her experiences would become the foundation of the greatest civilization humanity has ever known. Her experiences, transformed into symbols and legends, would shape the teachings of priests, the hieroglyphs inscribed upon sacred stones, and the stories whispered under the starlit desert sky.

The dream became art, and art transformed into a secret language: the whisper of the cosmos translated into human strokes. In each work of *Dream of a Night in Giza*, lives the memory of a moment that was and will be. Since art is a bridge, I believe that dreams are the roots that connect the heart of the Earth with the soul of the universe.

I am Dan Aug, a Uruguayan-Italian visual artist, explorer of the border between the visible and the invisible. My life is a suspended bridge between science, science fiction and art. For as long as I can remember, **the night sky has been my only temple**. In 2005, my artwork Xanadu Joyful Day, inspired by the Huygens mission to Titan, was acclaimed and awarded a first prize by the scientific community of NASA and ESA and led me to international exhibitions. But my true exploration began with A "Dream of a Night in Giza", that opened the door to the unknown within the framework of the Ancient Egyptian Civilization. The sands of the "Land of Kemet" still hold mysteries to be revealed, This is intended to be a fictional novel to accompany or explain my artistic & pictorial artworks ... one more daring and fantastic theory about that civilization that left us and continues leaving us, literally astonished.

Chapter 1: Princess Neferu meditates

The night spread over the banks of the Nile like a vast and deep velvet mantle, woven with threads of ancestral whispers and sprinkled with the mystery of a thousand untold stories. Time stood still around her, and the air vibrated with a silence filled with questions that only the hearts of the initiated could hear.






Artwork: "Temple of Isis in Philae" — © DanAug 2013 Acrylic on canvas: 100 cm x 120 cm x 3 cm.
